

When summer arrives and the igusa reaches around 170 cm in height, it is finally time for harvest.

After harvesting, the igusa is dyed with a special natural clay used specifically for rush grass, then dried and packed into bags.

Our work begins just after 3:00 a.m.—a demanding routine we continue every day for about a month. Still, we put our utmost care into every step, hoping that our tatami will reach our customers in the best possible condition and bring them lasting satisfaction.

The traditional clay-dyeing process also gives tatami its distinctive, calming aroma.
